Getting bitten by a snake would be pretty bad but I'm inclined to say coming last

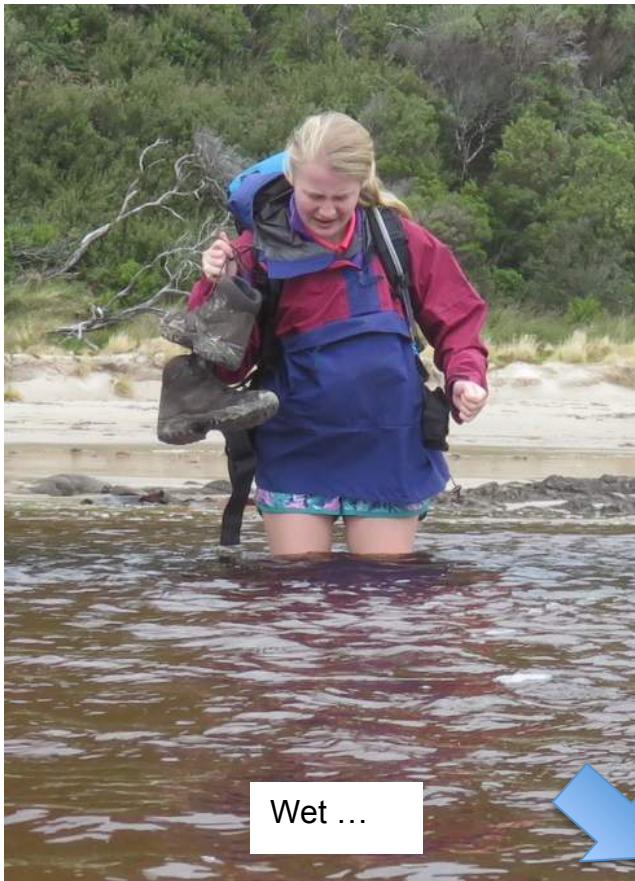
